"...On either side of the river is the tree of life ... and the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations..." (Revelation 22: 2)

During the season of Lent, the 7 weeks leading us to the celebration of Christ's resurrection on Easter morning, there will be a different kind of tree in our sanctuary symbolizing God's desire for healing, reconciliation and restoration among all of God's people and other living creatures who call Earth their home. Each Sunday and Wednesday during worship there will be a time to write down your prayer requests on paper leaves and place them on the tree. The prayers will be ever before us reminding us of God's healing power and presence in our lives as together we seek wholeness.

As the season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 6, I will be praying for each member and guest of our church family, as together we seek God's healing in our lives. Each day God brings forth so many miracles in our lives and it will bring such joy to see the unfolding work of God in your life and in the life of our congregation. Adult Education Opportunities Abound!

Have you not known? Have you not heard? Covenant has wonderful education opportunities for all adults. Three different classes meet on Sunday Mornings at 10a...they are all informative and promote lots of lively discussion. Childcare is available for infants & toddlers; classes for pre-school-youth meet during this time:

- **THE DISCIPLES CLASS** meets in the large classroom on the right (choir warm-up room) in the Education Wing. We are using *The Present Word* series; a Bible based study that helps learners apply scriptures to every day living and the world situation. *The Present Word* is a joint publication of the Disciples of Christ, UCC, Moravian, and Presbyterian (USA and Cumberland). The focus changes quarterly and goes through the entire Bible every 6 years. Everyone receives a study book that allows you to keep pace with the class even when you need to be absent. Bob Kennel is the primary teacher but members of the class also periodically share teaching responsibilities. We also have a special Hazel-baked cake once per month on an unknown Sunday.
- SEEKERS CLASS meets in the last classroom on left (Youth Room) in the Education Wing. During February and March we will be studying *THE WAY OF FORGIVENESS*, an 8 week small group experience that explores Christ's call to live a forgiven and forgiving life. Jesus' teachings from the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7) provide the scriptural context for the study. All members, guests, and other "seekers" from the community at large are welcome. Come for the entire series, or join the group for one or more of the sessions.
- **HOT TOPICS** meets in the 2nd classroom on the right in the Education Wing. Are you looking for a safe place to explore the current topics and events of this world? Wondering how your faith might address a certain issue? Looking for a group made up of a variety of ages and stages that is satisfied with **not** coming to any particular consensus about the issues of the day, yet leaving you wanting more? Then *Hot Topics* is for you. The class has explored weekly topics such as capital punishment; war and "just war," torture; global warming and most recently, immigration.

Soon the class will read and discuss the book, *Middle Church: Reclaiming the Moral Values of the Faithful Majority from the Religious Right* by Bob Edgar. Edgar is a former congressman (D-PA) and former general secretary of the National Council of Churches USA. His book is written for Christians who identify not with the "right" or the "left" but with the "middle church". He challenges his readers to connect spiritual values to political issues and to be heard. Come join us...you'll be glad you did!

Adult Studies are also offered on Wednesday Evenings...

Wednesday Evenings, 6:30-7:30p, the adult study group meets in the large classroom on the right in the Education Wing. Through February the study is based on the work of Steven Covey, *The Seven Habits of Highly Effective Christians.* The study has been adapted by our own Don Downs, who is leading the group in developing a personal or family mission statement and learning how to keep your life in check. Childcare is provided for infants-school age children. We hope you'll drop by and join us for this exciting study on Wednesdays 6:30-7:30 pm. The Library Corner

The Good Book by Peter Gomes, preacher to Harvard University

Peter Gomes decided after many years, it was time to write a book for Christians and non-Christians who have only a passing knowledge of the Bible. He found in his work that there is much misunderstanding and frustration experienced when reading or discussing it with others.

He begins with what the Bible is about, how to use it, what to believe, what you need to know, its structure and to whom it belongs. Then he moves into interpretation.

Interpretation is difficult and can be dangerous, yet we all do it based on our understanding of life, experiences in Sunday school or with other Christians. It requires knowledge of the culture and history of the times in which the Bible was written as well as other theological information. When we have questions we can turn to a book like this, ask our Pastor or some other person we trust and respect.

The next section of the book called "The use and abuse of the bible" illustrates how some texts are used to alienate people rather that be inclusive. The author deals with race, anti-Semitism, women and sexuality.

The final section, "The true and lively Word" concerns five question: Am I the only one confused?, What can I trust?, Am I on my own?, Can I feel good about myself? and How can I face the future? The last seven chapters are each on individual topics like the Bible and suffering, the Bible and science, the Bible and evil and so on.

This is a wonderful book that is well written and filled with the author's humorous experiences on campus and in a congregation. Twenty-one pages of notes on each chapter and an index end the book.
